Open Innovation Challenge

I am very excited to attend the Open Innovation Challenge phase two <u>launch event today</u> with our guest speaker <u>Zahra Ebrahim</u>, co-founder and CEO of Monumental and an established strategist and leader whose focus is cities, equity and design.

You'll recall that we started the challenge by asking the question:

How might we collaborate within our communities to reimagine learning and education so that no one is left behind and all youth and adults can realize their full potential?

human-centered approach, grounded in collaborative and inclusive participation, is the key to bringing forward meaningful solutions.

To that end, five themes emerged from the first round of participants:

- Access and representation: Addressing the issue of unequal access to
 education to ensure underrepresented groups have a place in the classroom.
- Connecting learning to society: Students want more practical and experiential learning that helps them navigate the workplace with agility and knowledge
- Guided exploration: Guidance from trusted mentors, teachers and counsellors is fundamental to shaping a student's future.
- Curriculum flexibility and innovation: A flexible, accommodating approach
 to curriculum delivery and evaluation fosters inclusion, personalization and
 diversity.
- Transforming remote learning: Online learning has great potential in the hands of educators who are well supported to facilitate it and meet the needs of individual students.

These themes will be the basis upon which we move into the second round – or ideation stage – of the challenge, wherein teams will start developing solutions. You did not have to be part of phase one to be part of phase two so I will again encourage you to share this opportunity with your networks and bring forward your own ideas.

Halton in the Red Zone
